## **GUIDANCE NOTES FOR PLAYERS ENTERING REGIONAL TOURNAMENTS**

## 1. Introduction

England Masters Squash (ESM) offers competitive opportunities for men and women aged 35 and over, in five year segments up to 75+ for men and 55+ for women. The British Open and British Closed (National) Championships (run by England Squash) both have Masters categories. In addition, there are six regionally based tournaments run by ESM. Participation in any of these eight tournaments earns players points which, in the case of players who qualify to play for England, count for selection for the England teams in each age band who play in the Home Internationals at the end of the season.

## 2. Selection for England Teams

The criteria for selecting team members is as follows:

- The top four point holders in each age band at the end of the season are automatically selected.
- The remaining wildcard places are at the discretion of the Team Captain and Selector, who are appointed by the Masters Committee.
- Qualification is dependent on playing in at least two of the eight events, one of which must be the Open or Closed (which carry double points).
- For the wildcard sixth place in any team squad, players who have only played in one event during the season can be considered.
- Players participating in all six Regional tournaments will have their best five point totals considered. (The points matrix and lists of points accrued in each age category can be viewed on the ESM website).
- Points that have been accrued in a lower age group can be included in a players total for selection in an older age group team.
- Players qualify for the older age group team immediately on attaining the relevant birthday, and carry upward their points accrued during the season. If they do not achieve an automatic top four place by virtue of accrued points, and are not selected for the age group in which they started the season, they can be selected for the team in the higher age group, especially if they have played for England in the previous two seasons.
- Players are entitled to be considered to play in a lower age group.
- The British Open counts as the first points-carrying Tournament of the forthcoming season.

## 3. Entering Regional Tournaments

## 3.1 Eligibility to Play:

3.1.1 Players must be registered with England Squash Masters (ESM) to be able to enter. Guidance on registration, how to enter tournaments and pay the entry fee, is on the website.

- 3.1.2 All Regional tournaments are open to any player aged 35 or over, regardless of nationality.
- 3.1.3 Players (men and women) can only enter one age group.
- 3.1.4 Players must make themselves available to play on any of the three tournament days as required by the draw and schedule. Players who cannot commit to the draw and schedule as issued should withdraw from an event.
- 3.1.5 The tournaments commence at 2.00 pm on the Friday. Every effort will be made to accommodate players who give a later arrival time, but this cannot be guaranteed. Players may be required to play more than once on one or more days depending on the size of the draw.
- 3.1.6 If players are in a 32 knockout draw they must be available to play from 4.00 pm on the Friday, at the latest, in order to complete two matches on the same day, where required. The Event Coordinator will notify all first round players of a 32 draw who are required to play earlier than their requested start time to ensure they are still able to compete in the tournament.
- 3.1.7 The entry fee must be paid before registration closes. Players will not be entered into the draw if payment is late, but they will be eligible to remain on the reserve list or get a full refund.

# 3.2 Event Registration:

3.2.1 Players must register for events by the closing date. Late entries, or players whose payment cleared after the registration closes, will be offered a place on the reserve list in the order of registration. Players on the reserve list may be included in the main draw if a player withdraws from the relevant age group, or at the discretion of the Draw Master (Chairman).

## 3.3 Draw Size and Composition:

- 3.3.1 The maximum draw size of a regional event age group is 32. If this limit is exceeded, players will be placed on a reserve list in the order of registration.
- 3.3.2 The draw type based on the number of players are as follows:

3.3.3 Players should expect to play the matches as detailed below based on the draw type:

8 Knockout	2 matches Saturday, 1 match Sunday

2 Pools of 3 with placing play-offs	2 matches Saturday, 1 match Sunday
5 Pool	1 match Friday, 2 matches Saturday, 1 match Sunday
4 Pool	2 matches Saturday, 1 match Sunday
3 Pool	2 matches Saturday
4 Knockout or Monrad	2 matches Saturday

\* Note this guidance may be subject to change due to court availability.

3.3.4 Every effort is made to guarantee players at least two matches. In the case of draws of eight players or more, players who lose their first match will be offered the opportunity to play in a Plate event, but must opt in by telling the Event Coordinator immediately after their match. Most plate matches will be scheduled on the Saturday. All plate matches carry points for England selection. Each round of the main draw will be played on the same day, in a block if possible.

# 3.4 Player Seeding, Age Group Draw Creation and Scheduling

- 3.4.1 The Draw Master (Chairman) is responsible for the creation of the age group draws and the scheduling of the event. The Draw Master will seek advice from age group seeding representatives in order to seed the players, and will also take into consideration past results and personal knowledge.
- 3.4.2 The seeded position of players will be shown on the draw as follows 1, 2, 3-4, 5-8, 9-16, 17-32. Players in a seeded range (3-4, 5-8 etc.) will be entered in these positions randomly and no consideration will be given to the relative ranking of the players within this range.
- 3.4.3 The draws and playing schedule will be available on the website soon after the closing date for each tournament. Players should check the homepage regularly up to and including the day of the tournament in case any alterations have been necessary. In very exceptional circumstances alterations may be made after 12 noon on the day before the tournament. Players affected by these changes will be notified individually by the Event Coordinator, where possible.
- 3.4.4 The playing schedule will stipulate the start time and court for each match. This may be amended by the Event Coordinator in conjunction with the Draw Master (Chairman), but an earlier time will only be with the agreement of both players. There will be allowance, depending on court availability, for players who unavoidably arrive after their scheduled start time.

# 3.5 Match Conduct

3.5.1 Matches should be conducted in accordance with World Squash Singles Rules 2014, noting the exceptions to the scoring method detailed in paragraph 3.5.3 below.

- 3.5.2 Players are required to mark matches. This will normally be the loser of the previous match on court, but may be varied at the discretion of the Event Coordinator.
- 3.5.3 Scoring will be Point-a-Rally (PAR) scoring for all age groups as follows:
  - PAR to 11 Men's Over 35, 40, 45, 50, 55; Women's Over 35, 40, 45
  - PAR to 15 Men's Over 60, 65, 70, 75, 80; Women's Over 50, 55, 60

## 3.6 Points for Regional Events

- 3.6.1 The aim of the points scheme is:
  - To encourage participation in Masters' events.
  - To provide updated Points Ranking Lists and aid Tournament organisers to seed players.
  - To provide automatic selection for Home Internationals teams.
- 3.6.2 The points awarded are as follows for each type of draw:

#### Knockout Draws:

## Example:

A player who loses 3-1 in the semi-final of a 32 draw with a bye in the first round:

1 <sup>st</sup> Round (Last 32) Bye* =	60 pts
2 <sup>nd</sup> Round (Last 16) Win =	60 pts
Quarter Finals Win =	80 pts
Semi Final loses won 1 game =	50 pts
Total =	250 pts

\* A Bye is awarded the points equivalent to a match win.

The pool stages will be award points based on the 4 Pool points allocation for each round.

## 7 Draw (2 x 4 Pool with Play-off):

The pool stages will be award points based on the 5 Pool points allocation for each round. The pools will be configured for 4 players in each pool and the pool with 3 players will receive a bye for the 4<sup>th</sup> player place.

#### **Plate Matches:**

Plate matches are awarded the same amount of points for every round in a plate draw as follows:

## 3.7 Withdrawing from an Event

- 3.7.1 **Before Registration Closes**: Players can only withdraw by contacting the Event Coordinator. Players who withdraw from the event before the event registration closing date will be entitled to a registration fee refund or a credit to the next Regional event, whichever is preferred by the player.
- 3.7.2 After Registration Closes but Before the Tournament Day: Players who withdraw are required to inform the Event Coordinator or Chairman by email or telephone, giving the reason. The entry fee will not be refunded.
- 3.7.3 **On the Tournament Day:** Players must contact the Event Coordinator, immediately by telephone. Leaving a message is not sufficient. This may result in alterations to the draw if the withdrawal significantly affects the seeding or if it gives a player two byes. The entry fee **will not** be refunded.
- 3.7.4 If the Draw Master does not accept the reason for withdrawal and/or the player has withdrawn from two successive Regionals, they will be excluded from the next Regional event or longer.

- 3.7.5 The ban from the next tournament will also apply to any player who leaves a tournament early without fulfilling their playing commitments and thereby inconveniences other players.
- 3.7.6 If the Draw Master receives an appeal against exclusion, the Vice-Chairman and Events Coordinator must be consulted before making a decision.

# 3.8 Event Cancellation

**3.8.1** If there is any doubt about a tournament taking place (e.g. because of bad weather), a notice will be displayed on the website not later than 12 noon on the day before the tournament confirming go-ahead or postponement. If a tournament has to be postponed, every effort will be made to re-arrange it.
