MENS OVER 40 REPORT



England vs Ireland

The Men's Over 40s started their Home Internationals campaign against a strong Ireland side. Steve Davies started play at number 5 against Dermot Mcnamarra. This was a brutal encounter that last 75 mins we the Irishman coming out on top in a 5-game thriller.

Next up was Ross Kneller making his England debut at number 3 against Pat Morrissey. Despite the complete contrast in styles Ross proved to quick around the court and won 3-0.

The number 1s were next up, with England's Phil Rushworth taken on Nigel Peyton. They had an epic encountered last year and not surprisingly, the quality of squash was very high. Phil came out of with a 3-0 win.

Next up was this year's Captain Neil Cross who played Mark Furlong. After a tight first game, Neil led by example and moved very well around the court to take the win 3-0.



The final match saw another England debutant Paul Macdonald, taken on Niall Rooney. This was another high-quality match which saw Paul come out victorious 3-1 sealing it with a backhand rolling nick. England off to a very solid start winning 19-4.

England vs Scotland

Day 2 kicked off with England playing Scotland. Tony Webb started proceedings at 5 with a very disciplined performance beating Ross Allan 3-0.

Next up was Ross Kneller who played hard hitting Callum Phillip. In a frantic match Ross got the victory 3-0. However, all 3 games went down to the wire.

Next up was Phil Rushworth who gave a solid disciplined performance beating Richard North 3-0.

Next up was Steven Davies who signed no signs of fatigue following his marathon match the day before having a convincing 3-0 win over Stewart Morrison.

In the match of leg, Paul Macdonald faced Callum Reid. Callum went 2-0 up but a determined Paul fought back to take this to a fifth game tie break. A couple of controversial decisions occurred towards the end of the decider, which saw Callum take in 12-10 in the fifth.

WOMENS OVER 35/40 REPORT



Our event took place during the last weekend of 2024/25 Home International Championships, meaning 11 of the titles had already been secured, 7 of which had been taken by England and we desperately wanted to add to this number!

Furthermore, when looking at the (oversized) ladies o35/40 trophy, it is clear to see the dominance of England over the years, with our teams having only lost once since 1994; to Scotland in 2013. The pressure was therefore high to put in a winning performance.

Our team was strong through the order, with Selina Harper (playing at 3) and Natalie Lawrence (playing at 4) bringing their years of experience at the Home Internationals, alongside Kirsty West (playing at 1) and Keeley Peacock (playing at 5) who were debutants this year and eager to secure their first cap. Natalie Davenport-Husdan made her second appearance in two years (once again playing at 2 for the team) and the Captain completing her fourth year in four (bringing up the rear at 6).

We knew this was a strong team and there were notable absences in our opposition teams, with Tanya Scullion absent for Ireland, Lizzie Little having had to withdraw at short-notice for Scotland and a weakened Welsh Team toward the top of the order due to injury and pregnancy.

So, on Friday afternoon we set out to begin our campaign, against Ireland at Cardiff SRC, where the bright sunshine of a Cardiff May evening beat through the glass ceiling onto the court. The Captain stepped on court first against Patricia Ryan and, after a nervous start, secured the win in 3 games, leading by example. Next up was Selina, against Michelle Heraughty and taking the first two games convincingly, at 10-0 in the third game an "out of court" call on the service prevented a bagel, but Selina quickly finished the game 11-2. Kirsty then stepped on court, playing at 1 against Siobhan Parker who was playing at the top of the order due to the absence of Tanya Scullion. In a feat of consistency Kirsty won the match in 3, dropping 6 points in each game and was then able to celebrate her first cap, her first win for England and her Birthday all on the same evening.

Keeley then took to the court to earn her first cap, against Helen Byrne, with her new Husband providing support and encouragement. Another nervous start but Keeley quickly overcame this to take another 3-0 win. The final match saw Natalie Davenport-Husdan demonstrate absolute focus and determination to win hers in 3 (11-3, 11-4, 11-1). Team England could not have asked for a better start to the weekend: England = 20, Ireland = 0.

Saturday morning and back at Cardiff SRC, where the morning May sunshine was blazing through the glass roof onto the other side of the court, our team got ready to take on Scotland, who we knew had had a tight match the previous evening against Wales (losing a narrow 3-2). Again the Captain led from the front, against Catriona Smith winning the first game convincingly (11-5) but allowing nerves to get the better of her winning the second game 11-9 but dropping the third 9-11, before regaining control and taking the final game 11-5 to begin the morning with a 3-1 win. It was at this point that our 2024 Captain and 2025 reserve player Michelle Knight arrived with our top supporter Sandra Knight to

cheer on the team against

Scotland and Wales. Michelle has had a tough year due to injuries and only narrowly missed selection this year, but still came to support, showing her commitment to the team and to our sport. (She also returned the trophy, avoiding embarrassment at the awards ceremony on the Saturday evening!!). Next on court was Selina against Sara Brown, where Selina proved too strong for the Scottish player, taking the match in 3. Kirsty then stepped on court against Katy Temple, who was now playing at 1 due to the late withdrawal of Lizzie Little earlier in the week. In a feat of mind-blowing consistency Kirsty took the match in

3 games, dropping 6 points in each game, to match her earlier point score against Siobhan. Our next player on court, making her debut of this weekend, was Nat Lawrence who began with a few nerves, winning the first game 11-6 but then quickly overcame them to win the second 11-3 with a killer drop to end that game, she then polished off the match 3-0 with an 11-5 score in the 3rd. Finally, Natalie Davenport-Husdan went up against Sheena Logan, showing more nerves than the previous evening but winning the first game 11-5, then battling to take the second 12-10 before finally finding her stride again (after some tough love from Kirsty between games) to win the 3rd 11-4 and take the match 3-0. So, another strong performance from England showed dominance over Scotland: England = 20, Scotland = 1.



The final match against Wales was held at the Sport Wales National Centre where Team Wales had set up camp all weekend, notably lacking the blazing sunshine anywhere on the court and with much more viewing capability. First to step on court for the final match was Keeley against Rachel Green; again, some nerves crept in to the first game, however, Keeley took the second with a strong 11-0 before Rachel conceded in the third game due to injury. Next Selina was up against Sarah Creed, errors from Sarah early on along with sustained pressure exerted by Selina saw another 3-0 win for England (11-6, 11-4, 11-5). The next match saw Kirsty take on Stacey Gooding, this was never going to be a match England would expect to win,

however, undeterred, Kirsty started strong, winning the first point and forcing some uncharacteristic errors from Stacey, Kirsty went 6-4, 8-5, 9-6 up and took the first game 11-7 with a strong performance throughout and absolute pride amongst her teammates. The second game predictably Stacey came back fighting to win it 11-1. However, into the third game and Kirsty took an early lead again at 4-3 and after some consistent rallies Kirsty played a killer shot to bring the score back to 7-7 and then took the lead again to 9-7. A lucky shot enabled Stacey to equalise at 9-9 and she managed to scrape the win 11-9, despite an exceptional effort from Kirsty. Kirsty continued to show huge effort and heart in the fourth game, pushing Stacey to 7-9 but finally Stacey proved too much and took the fourth 11-7. What a performance by both players, but particularly from Kirsty to take it to Stacey all the way to the end of the match. Next on court was Nat Lawrence against Anna Adams where the first two games were a battle, with Nat coming out on top with an 11-9 and 12-10 win before finding her form and winning the third convincingly 11-3 to take the match 3-0. The final match of the event was Natalie Davenport-Husdan against one of the biggest characters of the Wo35/40 event, Rebecca Baker. This match was played in great spirit but in the first two games Natalie was just too much for Rebecca, taking them convincingly 11-5, 11-3. A few mistakes crept in at the start of the third game, which were monopolised by Rebecca, seeing the Welsh player go 4-0 up, however, Natalie fought back and took the third 11-9. England = 18, Wales = 3.

So, England score 58 points out of a possible 60 to take the win for the 2024/25 Home International Championships, beating Ireland 5-0, Scotland 5-0 and Wales 4-1. I could not be prouder to have been selected as the Captain this year and to have led this awesome group of ladies to such a dominating win. Excellent individual performances all around and a great team spirit throughout the weekend.



Our win was made even more special by the other teams playing in Cardiff: Mo40, Wo60 and Mo60 teams all winning their events, making ours the only weekend of this season where England achieved a clean sweep.

Finally, from me it just remains to thank the organisers of the Welsh event Russell Edwards and Tomos Rosser, the Home International committee, especially our England Squash Masters rep Allen Barwise, all the tournament referees throughout the weekend and everyone who came to support us. Special thanks to Michelle and Sandra Knight for coming all that was to support us against Scotland and Wales and finally thanks to my amazing team: Kirsty, Natalie, Selina, Nat and Keeley. Congratulations to you all, here's to the memories!
